Letter from Executive Officer

In 1972, the Ashland Women's Health Center opened as an all-volunteer organization focused on women's health. In 2022, as we celebrated 50 years of service, we had the good fortune to convene many of our founders in recognition and celebration of our extraordinary growth and expansion. While our name and scope of work has evolved since our beginnings above a candy shop on Main Street, the fundamental principle that drives us remains: to elevate the health and well-being of our community. Rogue Community Health, as a proud Federally Qualified Health Center, has a dual private/public role: we take care of individuals as well as the communities people call home.

In 2022, we expanded our services to care for more residents. A second dental office was opened at our East Main Street campus, the Rogue Way Home housing program celebrated its grand opening, and our Eagle Point facility will open in late fall.

The Rogue Way Home helped create pathways to care for those uprooted in the last three years by wildfire, providing and integrating services to address food insecurity, mental health, lack of transportation, social support and other vital needs. The Jackson has now served as a launching point for 30 community members to reclaim their lives, enhance their self-sufficiency, and return to permanent housing.

We added 32 positions to our staff in the past year, and we expect to continue growing in 2023. To address this challenge, we are partnering with OCHIN to support educational opportunities and pathways to employment and supporting regionwide provider recruitment efforts.

We were delighted to welcome many of you back last November to our first in-person annual luncheon in three years. We were joined by our community partners as well as state and national officials to discuss improving health and well-being in the Rogue Valley and the pivotal role community health centers play in health equity.

We will continue our efforts to assist everyone we touch in reaching their full health potential. Thank you for joining us in bringing vibrant health to all.









2022 Focus: New East Main Dental Clinic opened

2023 Focus: New Eagle Point Health Center, development of East Campus

Our new Eagle Point Health Center opens in 2023, with dental services starting in summer. This is only the beginning of a new period of growth and service expansion to better serve our members and the community.

We are working on evolving our clinics to be comprehensive campuses that offer integrated health and human services, in partnership with our community, to provide **vibrant health for all.** What this will look like is all of our services available in the areas we serve, thoughtfully designed to provide better experience for patients, providers, and partners, with an eye toward equity and a sense of belonging. Our aim is for whole-person wellbeing, and care for complete individuals through a coordinated team approach that involves combined medical care, dental care, and behavioral health care.



The current administration buildings on East Main will become our future behavioral health center and the current behavioral health building will give way to a newly-constructed extension of our Medford East Main Health Center. This, along with the addition of the East Main Dental Clinic, puts us well on our way to achieving an integrated Medford East Campus as a first step on our journey toward such centers throughout the region we serve.

Rogue Way to Health: Member Stories Through the Eyes of Our Community Health Workers

"A member I've worked with since July finally received housing in January! Challenged by having to reapply several times due to no consistent address, he was on waitlists for four years in both Jackson and Josephine counties. This discouraged him and he was losing hope of finding housing. Limited social security income and health complications presented more difficulty. We worked to advocate for him and I reassured him that something good would come. In December we were notified that he was approved for an apartment and could move in quickly. He is so happy to have a stable place to call home."

"We received a referral for a student at Eagle Point High School who needed assistance getting prescription glasses, personal health supplies, and transportation. By listening to this student's mother, we learned she was unable to take care of many of her family's needs due to language barriers. The first action item was to connect with our SBHC. Our School Care Coordinator (SCC) helped this member connect with Walmart Vision Center, Lions Club, and Advance Care to get glasses for her daughter. The SCC also served as an interpreter to assist with appointments."




Looking Back

50th Anniversary Celebration: 1972-2022

Looking Forward

Technology Advancement: Augmented Intelligence

In 2023, we will be taking a major leap forward to a new holistic, multidisciplinary, and population-based model of care toward our mission of Vibrant Health for All. By implementing new technologies, such as *augmented intelligence* software, we can better address the barriers to care. By integrating this new software with our electronic medical records system, we have the exciting new capability to gather information related to social determinants of health. Our multidisciplinary team of medical, pharmacy, dental, behavioral health clinicians, and Community Health Workers will be able to use this data to engage with patients, providing an unprecedented level of comprehensive whole-person care.



Area Highlights



Medical

52 FTE: Physicians, Nurse Practitioners and Physician Assistants, Nurses, Laboratory and other personnel

2022 Focus: Treating Diabetes and Hypertension¹

- Due to the ongoing pandemic, 36% of visits were conducted virtually.
- COVID-19 vaccination rates improved, and cases decreased.

Clinical staff emerged with better tools to facilitate equitable and quality care for patients, and metrics for chronic conditions such as hypertension and diabetes improved.

Women's Health: 1,046 patients screened for cervical cancer; 660 patients screened for breast cancer **Colorectal Cancer:** 1,005 patients aged 50-74 screened for colorectal cancer **Obesity:** 5,554 patients aged 18 and over received BMI screening and follow up plan **HIV Screening:** 3,091 patients

2023 Focus: In addition to continued telemedicine availability, we incorporated remote patient monitoring for blood glucose, weight, and blood pressure.



Pediatrics

3 FTE: Physicians, Nurse

2022 Focus: Instituted the *Early Vision Screening Program* to help prevent development delays and lasting vision problems due to delayed diagnosis.

- Became a *Reach Out and Read* site to help families read daily.
- COVID vaccines and boosters rolled out to all age groups throughout year.

Childhood Obesity: 1,316 children aged 13-16 screened for obesity and counseled on nutrition and physical activity.

2023 Focus: New First Tooth program provides preventative fluoride treatments during office visits.



Behavioral Health Care

17 FTE: Licensed Clinical Social Worker, Licensed Mental Health Providers, and other Mental Health Personnel

2022 Focus: Diagnosing and Treating Depression and Anxiety Disorders²

- Doubled Behavioral Health staff, allowing for increased access.
- Increased in-person to 41% of visits and streamlined virtual visits.

Tobacco Use: 5,950 patients aged 18 years and older screened for tobacco use and received cessation counseling intervention if a tobacco user.

Depression: 5,533 patients aged 12 years and older received a follow up plan after screening positive for depression.

2023 Focus: Expanded Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services, and decreased wait times by integrating Peer Support and Certified Alcohol Drug Counselors.

Community Health Services

30 FTE: Case Managers, Eligibility Assistance Workers, and Community Health Workers

2022 Focus: Screening of patients and residents for Social Determinants of Health.

- Team grew to 41 positions supporting clinics, transitional housing, partners and schools.
- 12,158 patient screened for needs at Ashland, White City, and Medford clinics, and 220 households screened at transitional housing properties.
- Navigated members and wildfire survivors to resources including housing, food, primary medical care, dental, and behavioral health services.

Top five needs for clinical patients: Dental, Behavioral Health, Housing, Food, and Transportation. Top five needs for tenant households: Transportation, Dental, Employment, Medical, and Food.

2023 Focus: building community partnerships to identify and address community gaps and remove barriers to meeting needs.



13 FTE: Dentists, Hygienists, expanded Function Dental Assistants, and Patient Service Representatives

2022 Focus: Oral Screenings, Restorative, and Emergency Services³

- Completed 5,000+ visits, including 1,000 patients needing urgent and emergency care.
- Opening of East Main in Medford, effectively doubled our capacity. Now serving patients in Medford at two locations five days a week and in Butte Falls monthly.

Preventative Care:

Fluoride treatment administered to 1,543 patients. Sealants applied to 150 children aged 6-9 years old.

2023 Focus: New Eagle Point clinic opens this summer.







Pharmacy

17 FTE: Pharmacists, Technicians, Delivery, and Support staff

2022 Focus: Training our growing workforce; implementing new pharmacy system.

- Identified patients at high risk for COVID complications and prescribed Paxlovid appropriately and administered COVID vaccines.
- Expanded Immunization service to include high-dose flu immunizations and flu clinics.
- Developed Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) program, certified to dispense medication for patients with substance use disorders. Trained staff on Naloxone use and distributed Narcan.
- Resumed internship program with OSU and Pacific University.

Top prescriptions: diabetes and hypertension control medications.

Emergency Medication program: funded by foundation grants, provides access to insulin and treatments for substance use.

2023 Focus: Expansion of remote patient monitoring for blood pressure and blood glucose; new birth control prescription program.



Transitional Housing Program

13 FTE

2022 Focus: Building community partnerships to support whole-person well-being.

- All 84 units at the Jackson were filled in the first four months. Properties averaged 95% occupancy, with 30 members moving to permanent housing in 2022.
- Sheltered wildfire survivors and housed hospital decompression patients at three other transitional housing properties.
- Provided individual case management and organized onsite fairs, classes, and therapeutic groups for residents.

Permanent Housing: 93% of tenants moved successfully into stable living situations.

2023 Focus: Working with partners to provide resource navigation, healthy food, nutrition education, counseling, peer support, and workforce training.



School-Based Health Centers (SBHC)

22 FTE

2022 Focus: Wider access for 8,000 total students in Eagle Point School District (D9), Butte Falls, and Crater Lake Academy.

- Hired a School Care Coordinator (SCC) to support Social Determinants of Health.
- Added a school nurse and school-health assistant to help with unique services such as tube feedings, urinary catheters, insulin shots and monitoring to medically fragile students.
- Increased Behavioral Health access to students in all District 9 schools.
- Provided oral assessments and education, fluoride varnish and sealants, and referrals for students.

642 students were seen through 1324 visits, primarily for Behavioral and Mental Health

2023 Focus: Includes developing student outreach for Behavioral Health Services to ensure all students who would like or need services are receiving them.
